Principal's Message

Dear Oakridge Families

It was so nice to meet with you last week for conferences. I am enjoying getting to know you and your children.

Your children have recently completed the beginning of year benchmark assessments for Acadience in math and reading as well as the I-Ready math diagnostic assessment. We will use this data to determine the best instructional supports to help your child continue to progress in their mastery in the content areas.

Our teachers are using a new math curriculum this year, I-Ready, as a resource to teach the math standards. Math has been identified as an area of focus for our school this year. We are dedicating paraprofessional support to assist with math small group instruction, purchasing math materials, and meeting in weekly PLC meetings to discuss math. We will be monitoring our school data to share with you throughout the year.

I appreciate your involvement and commitment to our school and ask for your help in addressing a problem. We have many people in our community who utilize our school grounds with their pets in the evenings and on the weekends. On a daily basis our students are encountering dog waste on the field areas. We have posted signs asking for people to be responsible in picking up their dog waste. Unfortunately, we still have many who are not doing that nor following the leash laws. I am asking you to help us remind those in our community to be responsible when they are on our school property. Granite School District Police will begin regularly patrolling to help issue reminders and citations when necessary.

I have had conversations with many of you about school emergency preparedness. For this reason, I have included specific information in the newsletter regarding the types of drills we will be discussing and practicing this year.

Safety Information

School safety protocols are initiated by police in the event of a potential or direct threat to student safety. An understanding of each type of protocol is invaluable for students, staff and parents.

The first type of protocol is called a **Lockout** protocol. A Lockout is initiated when there is a potential threat to student safety **off campus**. For example, local police may require a school to initiate a Lockout if there is police activity in a nearby neighborhood, or if there is some form of hazard near the school.

During a Lockout, students and staff are brought inside the building and all exterior doors are locked. School activities are allowed to proceed as normal inside the school. Unless otherwise directed, parents and visitors will not be allowed on the campus until the protocol is lifted.

If there is a threat to student safety **on campus**, a school may be placed on **Lockdown**. This protocol requires all students, staff and approved visitors to move to the nearest room and lock the door.

A **Lockdown** is initiated if there is a direct threat to student safety on the campus. During a Lockdown protocol staff and approved visitors will move to the nearest room and lock the door. Once inside a room, students and staff will take cover out of sight.

This protocol is initiated as quickly as possible when law enforcement or school administration perceive a direct threat to students and staff, such as a burglary or an individual looking to cause harm.

RUN, HIDE, FIGHT

In addition to these protocols, there are certain events require dynamic actions beyond established plans.

In a situation where someone is actively seeking to cause harm on the campus, staff members will use situational awareness to assess the circumstances as best they can.

Using this information, they will lead students to either:

RUN – if a clear path escape if available;

HIDE – if the attacker seems near or escape is not feasible;

FIGHT - as a last resort if confronted

State and federal law enforcement agencies encourage use of Run, Hide, Fight for schools and businesses during unpredictable situations where someone is looking to cause harm. In Granite School District we employ our own 20-member police force to ensure a greater law enforcement presence at schools and significantly decrease response times.

School Goals for 2022-2023

Academic Goals

At least 88% of students will be at or above benchmark as measured by the 2022-2023 End of Year Acadience Reading assessment. Student literacy will be monitored through Acadience Reading Middle of Year assessment and progress monitoring.

Compared to schoolwide performance on the 2021 RISE, students' average test performance on the 2023 Math RISE will increase by 9% to a schoolwide proficiency rate of 76%
