Based on the 2023 WIDA Access Exam, 80% of students will meet their WIDA Growth Target.

This goal will be monitored using proficiency monitoring throughout the school year on reading assessments and proficiency towards standards.

- 1. Hiring .5 FTE to have a full-time technology/instructional coach at Oakwood Elementary School. The instructional coach's primary role is to work with educators to implement research-based practices and encourage reflective practice. The Granite School District pays for .5 FTE already for each school to have a ½ time Technology Coach at their school
- 2. Implementation of the LETRS reading program by our K-3 teachers.
- 3. Implementation of Amira benchmark/diagnostic and progress monitoring to determine most effective action steps in helping a student achieve typical or above typical growth.
- 4. Implementation of iReady Math diagnostic assessments and progress monitoring to determine most effective action steps in helping a student achieve typical or above typical growth.
- 5. Targeted Tier II and III instructional interventions determined by student data.
- 6. Paraeducators to support classroom teachers with push-in and/or pull-out supports for our students in need. Paraeducators will work with students based on the class curriculum and interventions established by the classroom teacher. Our DYAD reading coordinator will organize volunteers and reading program to work with our struggling readers to increase their proficiency.
- 7. Summer professional development time for our newly formed grade level PLCs. Teachers will receive \$200 stipend for completing 2 days (4 hours a day) between June 5 August 4 where they will meet in their grade level PLC to collaborate and plan for next school year. Topics will be centered around our Academic goal.
- 8. Our school follows the Granite School District Educational Technology program for digital citizenship found at (https://www.graniteschools.org/edtech/digcit/). This is done by sharing this information in classes to students. to our patrons, and through including the information in our school's monthly newsletter. Our school's White Ribbon Week will be dedicated to internet safety and we will be providing in-person support and online support to our community.


