We all got through last year, in no small part, thanks to the efforts of Skyline teachers.


A little context might be helpful. The graph shows the percent of all grades given that were failing during the first quarter in the previous three years and this year. Skyline has a tradition of working very hard to help all students find success academically. You can see, last year was much more of a struggle and many more students encountered difficulty. I will say, teachers did heroic work to help students find success. They also have done a great deal to help students recover some of the credits lost during last year.

Given the difficulty of last year, the number of students who were away from the classroom, and the heightened issues we have seen this year in terms of adjustment back into school, I thought we would see a rate that was higher than what was our norm prior to the pandemic. Instead, you can see that we have reduced the rate of failing grades to be back in line with the norm.

I want to say that having students back makes things a lot easier for teachers and especially students. However, I don't think that is it alone. Teachers have continued to work with students and find solutions to obstacles. Teachers have set high expectations and provided scaffolding so more students can overcome difficulties and find success.

Much praise and adoration are due to our teachers for all they do for our students. I am grateful we have so many teachers who fight for their students to succeed despite whatever stands in the way. I know it is a constant struggle, but it is a work of love that helps all Eagles to RISE.
